

GUIDING THOUGHTS

What did I discover I was doing to inhibit this miracle of wholeness in a rehearsal, or even in a performance? The first destructive factor present was negativism. It is impossible for a negative element to produce a positive one, and surprisingly, we are all prone to be negative. I remember seeing on the Today Show the results of a study regarding our normal thought patterns. The results were alarming! The average person thinks negatively 95% of the time...

RELEVANCE

GUIDING THOUGHTS

If this human computer is recording primarily negative thinking brought about by daily circumstances often (but not always) beyond our control, and if my unconscious constantly colors the way my conscious mind perceives daily experiences, the results are obvious. What a challenge to attack negative thinking not only in rehearsals but during the rest of the day as well! (pp. 25-26)

Youth Choir can help us <u>reach</u> and <u>retain</u> teenagers by:

- ► Meeting specific identify-forming needs (emotional, social, spiritual, musical/artistic):

 - FriendshipAdult relationships

 - Learn empathy, humility, honesty, trust, respect Learn to look outside of themselves and serve Implement and test their faith and put it to use

RELEVANCE

Youth Choir can help us <u>reach</u> and <u>retain</u> teenagers by:

- ▶ Providing an organized structure/system with adult support for developing faith in a safe, supportive, trusting community.
 - Adults can help translate the faith by handing down the catechesis, language, and practices of Christianity in tangible and understandable ways.

 Adults can help teenagers in articulating their own faith.

RELEVANCE

Youth Choir can help us <u>reach</u> and <u>retain</u> teenagers by:

- Providing an organized structure/system with adult support for developing faith in a safe, supportive, trusting community.
 - Students can practice spiritual disciplines (prayer, bible study, testimony/witness)

 - Students can rehearse the Gospel in song
 Students can practice articulating their faith through sharing opportunities in and out of rehearsal

RELEVANCE

Youth Choir can help us <u>reach</u> and <u>retain</u> teenagers by:

- *Helping students transition out of

 Adolescence into young adulthood

 Inactive, passive faith to active faith engage
- *Providing a "cultural toolbox" to make faith consequential.

 A creed (an articulated God-story and belief)

 A community (a sense of belonging with peers and adults)

 A calling (a sense of purpose and significance)

 A challing (a sense of purpose and significance)

 A hope (the belief that God is moving the world somewhere).

pplication: A mission-minded, purposeful, service-based youth choir can actively elp provide a systematic way for adults and students to interact, a place for eveloping these tools, and a method to respond to the current challenges of aday's teenagers.

RELEVANCE

From Sticky Faith (Powell/Clark)

- Kids who left the faith report having questions about faith in early adolescence that were ignored by significant adults (parents, pastor, teacher).
- A factor causing kids to shelve their faith is the segregation of kids and adults in church. Kids who attend church-wide services are more likely to keep their faith.
- The more kids serve and build relationships with younger children the more likely they are to hang on to their faith.

► What comes to mind when you hear the word "retreat"?

Definition:

- An act of moving back or withdrawing: a speedy retreat | the army was in retreat.
- An act of changing one's decisions, plans, or attitude, esp. as a result of criticism from others: the unions made a retreat from their earlier position. A quiet or secluded place in which one can rest and relax: their mountain retreat in New Hampshire.
- A period of seclusion for the purposes of prayer and meditation: the bishop is away on his annual retreat | before his ordination he went on retreat.

RETREAT

Spirituality is the most practical thing in the whole wide world. RETREAT

RETREAT Youth Choir as an escape (or respite)

RETREAT Actions Points: Foster a welcoming, open environment that involves adult leaders (select carefully) Boundaries provide freedom and security Establish simple, clear guidelines about behavior, speech, attre. cell phones, etc. Create a structured rehearsal plan Keep things moving, focused, enjoyable, and productive Positive reinforcement Humor Chat chance Foster independent singing (not solo singing).

RETREAT Actions Points: Recognize birthdays or student achievements at school Connect with students before and after rehearsal Build an environment of healthy competition among the sexes/choir sections. Develop student leadership team (upperclassmen or seniors) Involve spouse Be consistent in expectations, recognition of successes, discipline, rehearsal flow/format Other ideas?

GUIDING THOUGHTS

YC is a place of connections (modes of engagement):

Musical, Mental, Physical, Emotional/Relational, Spiritual, and Social Connections

RELATIONSHIPS

Let the person who cannot be alone be aware of community. Let the person who is not in community beware of being alone. (p. 78)

Community does not necessarily mean living face to face with others, rather it means never losing the awareness that we are connected to each other. It is not about the presence of other people—it is about being fully open to the reality of relationship, whether or not we are alone. (p. 55)

RELATIONSHIPS

Unfortunately, community in our culture too often means a group of people who go crashing through the woods together, scaring the soul away. In spaces ranging from congregations to classrooms, we preach and teach, assert and argue, claim and proclaim, admonish and advise, and generally behave in ways that drive everything original and wild into hiding. Under these conditions, the intellect, emotions, will and ego may emerge, but not the soul: we scare off all soulful things, like respectful relationship, goodwill and hope. (p. 59)

RELATIONSHIPS

Key Ideas (Hurt 2.0)

- Adolescents desire meaningful relationships with other adolescents.
- Adolescents desire meaningful relationships with adults.
- Adolescents desire community and want to know that they are a part of something bigger than themselves—a place to make a meaningful contribution.
